

We also talked to


• palliative care workers

• helps you feel less alone






- listens to how you feel about dying

• everyone is important




• everyone should have a choice.

• care over a long time




• care that includes the family.

Bereavement support



We want to give **bereavement support**.

Bereavement support means help when you are sad because someone is dying.



Bereavement support can be for

• the person who is dying



• loved ones of the person who is dying.



Bereavement support is also for loved ones after someone has died.

What we will do



We will think about how to help workers make palliative care

- fair
- easy to get
- right for each person.

We will help workers to

• understand how you feel



• respect you.



We will make many more jobs for palliative care workers.



We want to make sure there are more workers in all parts of Queensland.





We will think about ways to find more workers who live away from big cities.

We will make palliative care services good places to work so workers stay with us.

- training for palliative care workers better
- more jobs for people who train palliative care workers.



We will help palliative care workers be good leaders.



We will give workers the things they need to give good care to everyone.



We will work together with other organisations so people get better palliative care.
