Hot Issues Brief

Code Yellow Stand Up - Redland Hospital 30 January 2019 4pm Update

Issue:

- At 4pm 30 January 2019 representatives from PAH, QEII, Logan, Redland, Metro South and QAS met to assess the bed capacity status across Metro South HHS following a Code Yellow Stand Up at Redland Hospital activated in the morning of 30 January 2019.
- Following status update from each facility representatives agreed that the Code Yellow Stand Up for Redland Hospital was de-escalated to Code Yellow Lean Forward at 4.30pm noting capacity at 4pm with 13 Awaiting Ward Admission (AWA) and Logan Hospital 24 AWA.
- Metro South will continue to seek MSH Patient Access Control Hub (PACH) help with QAS continuing load sharing to assist in extreme capacity for Logan and Redland Hospitals during this period.
- Representatives will again meet 8.30am 31 January 2019 to further discuss developments overnight and any further actions required to address continuing bed capacity issues.

Background:

- Code Yellow Stand Up was activated for Redland Hospital at 8.30am 30 January 2019 with extreme bed capacity in Logan Bayside with 42 patients Awaiting Admission (AWA) (15 Redland and 27 Logan).
- Redland Hospital activated Code Yellow Lean Forward on 29 January 2019 due to lack of available inpatient beds and Emergency Department capacity to see patients diminished through bed block and flow. Redland Hospital moved to a code yellow stand up at 8:30am 30 January 2019.
- Representatives from PAH, QEII, Logan, Redland Hospital and MD05 are holding regular teleconferences to work through the issues and discuss options across the facilities.
- Redland Hospital has managed to staff the transit lounge for the late and night shift opening a capacity of four beds overnight.
- Pandanus ward will close on 31 January 2019 for renovation bringing these staff to Redland for increased staffing capacity.
- The Mater Private Redland have taken three patients but these are being covered by Redland Medical officers which has stretched the medical team now to 93 inpatients.
- Redland will be minus 9 beds with closures for renovation at Wynnum and bed closure for patient management in Redland.
- PAH has 12 empty beds and 7 AWA. QEII has no AWA and 6 empty beds. Both PAH and QEII transit lounges are open and have capacity.
- Logan is managing extreme AWA opening short stay corridor and considering surgery cancellation.

Actions to date:

- As at 1.30pm 30 January 2019:
 - Whole of MSH facility triage meetings regarding Bed Capacity continue regularly with morning meeting only after assessment of situation.
 - Discussion with QAS around load sharing and advised of bed status and bed capacity.
 - Some patients transferred to Mater Private and to St Vincent's.
 - Surgery lists for 31 January 2019 at Redland and Logan being reviewed for possible cancellations.
 - PAH and PACH to review capacity to transfer some of the Logan patients to PAH to assist.

- At 4.30pm 30 January
 - Agreement was to move Redland back to Code Yellow lean forward overnight. Logan at this stage coping with capacity, though requesting QAS support for load sharing.
 - Discussion around escalation to executive for an extreme capacity document and process for Metro South which would include QAS in formal meeting prior to implementing code yellow. As for Logan and Redland extreme bed capacity is becoming business as usual with large numbers of AWA daily.
 - Further meeting at 8.30am 31 January 2019 to assess status across Metro South facilities and any further actions required at that time.
