## Dr Nick Goodwin, Chief Executive Officer and Co-Founder – IFIC

Nick co-founded IFIC in 2011 and became its first Chief Executive Officer in 2013. He is the Editor-in-Chief of the International Journal of Integrated Care and holds a range of research, educational and consultation roles worldwide.



He has worked with the World Health Organisation to support development of its Global Strategy on People-Centred Integrated Health Services and is on the Expert Advisory Team to WHO Regional Office for Europe's Framework for Action Towards Coordinated/Integrated Health Services Delivery. Additionally Nick has worked as a consultant to the Agency for Integrated Care, Singapore; the Pan American Health Organisation, Washington; WHO's Western Pacific Regional Office; and to the NHS.

In previous roles, Nick worked as a Senior Fellow at the King's Fund (2007-2013) leading work on integrated health and social care and a two-year Inquiry into the quality of care in English general practice. He has worked as a Senior Lecturer at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (2003-2007) where he directed MSc and PHD courses and worked as lead academic for the National Institute for Health Research.

In January 2016, Nick received the Avedis Donabedian International Award for his contribution to Healthcare Excellence and Integrated Health and Social Care.

## Dr Viktoria Stein, Head of Education and Training – IFIC

Viktoria joined IFIC in 2015 as Senior Fellow in Integrated Care and Head of the Integrated Care Academy©. She has developed IFIC's Education and Training programme, which provides a range of courses and tools to support knowledge transfer, skills development and technical know-how. Among the portfolio is the International Summer School on Integrated Care, a webinar series, and content provision for Master's programmes around the world. The courses are relevant and adaptable for the needs of students, researchers and professionals alike.



Viktoria holds a PhD in health economics, focussing on how to design contextualized integrated models of care and the change management around this. She has worked with the WHO Regional Office for Europe developing the Framework for Action on Coordinated/Integrated Health Services Delivery, and supporting WHO Member States to provide better services for ageing multi-morbid populations. Prior to joining WHO, she was a research assistant at the Medical University of Vienna.

Viktoria was a founding member of the Board of IFIC and is on the editorial board of the International Journal of Integrated Care. She is the founding president of the Young Researchers in Health Network, which will be further developed under the auspices of IFIC.
