INFORMATION FOR SEXUALLY TRANSMISSIBLE INFECTIONS (STIs) INCLUDED IN THE PROGRAM

Participating health services are provided with single dose treatment quantities of azithromycin, ceftriaxone and metronidazole to treat chlamydia, gonorrhoea and trichomoniasis free of charge to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander patients, their sexual partners, and/or patients at high-risk of not accessing treatment.

The program facilitates providing immediate and observed free treatment for eligible patients.

Diagnosis can be based on symptoms, sexual contact with individuals with an STI, and positive pathology results.
