Proposal type	Details
Regulatory proposals where no RIA is required	Forensic Science Queensland is currently experiencing significant delays in DNA testing. The amendments to the Police Powers and Responsibilities Act, moved during consideration in detail of the Victims of Crime Assistance and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2023, allow DNA material of a person suspected of committing an indictable offence to be held for three years if a proceeding for an indictable offence has not commenced, instead of one year. The objective is to ensure that DNA material does not have to be destroyed before it can be used to inform investigations or prosecutions. The amendments also allow certain historical records that were held in contravention of the PPRA to be retained for a further three years to assist the historical case reviews recommended by the Commissions of Inquiry into DNA testing in Queensland. Queensland Health has assessed the amendments and notes that the amendments relate to police powers and administration. No further regulatory impact analysis is required under the Queensland Government Better Regulation Policy.
