As discussed with Matt, please can you kindly seek urgent advice from QLD Health - COVID Incident Management Team about what funding arrangements will be in place when MBS item 69501 ceases on 1 January 2022.

Cwlth release

To assist states and territories with interstate rail crew and transport worker border crossings, the Australian Government created a unique Medicare item (69501), available to rail crew workers or heavy vehicle drivers who are required to travel interstate for work. MBS item 69501 is available for COVID-19 tests performed by private sector pathology providers who are approached directly by an interstate transport worker for a test. MBS item 69501 will cease on 1 January 2022.

As you are aware TMR has established <u>4x freight dedicated testing facilities</u>, operated by 4Cyte and QML. This Medicare cessation will call into question the viability of these facilities to continue if there is no funding in place.

For greater context whilst the <u>QLD Freight Protocol</u> is being amended next week to align with acceptable risk levels associated easing of border restrictions, the 7 day rolling surveillance testing will remain for freight. To date, no discussions have been held regarding the CHO's posturing for QLD asymptomatic testing of freight and logistics operators post 1 January 2022.

Also, 5x NSW freight-friendly testing sites are also closing on the 15th Dec. and the remaining will close for a Christmas period, increasing pressure on the QLD system.

I will need to convene a meeting to discuss as soon as feasible.

Please can you kindly keep us advised of your discussions with QLD Health and A/ CHO Dr Peter Aitken (I believe Dr Aitken is resuming DDG duties) as this is an issue that is escalated to Minister Bailey and TMR DG-Scales.

To assist states and territories with interstate rail crew and transport worker border crossings, the Australian Government created a unique Medicare item (69501), available to rail crew workers or heavy vehicle drivers who are required to travel interstate for work. MBS item 69501 is available for COVID-19 tests performed by private sector pathology providers who are approached directly by an interstate transport worker for a test. MBS item 69501 will cease on 1 January 2022.

The cost associated with interstate transport worker COVID-19 testing provided by state and territory governments continues to be covered under the National Partnership on COVID-19 Response (Partnership). The Australian Government provides financial support to all state and territory governments for COVID-19 testing through the Partnership, funding 50 per cent of the costs of public health testing facilities. Under the Partnership, all governments have committed to providing COVID-19 pathology testing to people in Australia free of-charge, including freight and transport workers.

Through the Partnership, the Australian Government has provided over \$7.0 billion in funding to support state and territory health systems respond to COVID-19 outbreaks as of 7 November 2021. In particular, the Partnership has provided \$270.0 million in the 2020-21 and 2021-22 financial years in direct funding to COVID-19 PCR testing delivered in state and territory clinics. Partnership funding is demand driven with no cap on funding.

This mechanism for the Australian Government to support ready access to testing for COVID-19 has been in place since the start of the pandemic and has worked well to support testing as a critical component of our successful response. A fundamental principle remains, and should continue, no costs should be imposed on those requiring a test, including necessary testing associated with border crossings.

Where COVID-19 testing is medically necessary and has been requested by a doctor, it is appropriately funded by the Australian Government through the MBS.

Where COVID-19 testing is undertaken for public health purposes, for example asymptomatic testing for travel, workplace testing, or testing of casual or close contacts, it is appropriately funded through the Partnership.

Based

What does this mean for providers?

The introduction of this new item affords private sector pathology providers the ability to provide microbio for SARS-CoV-2 to:

- asymptomatic workers of residential and in-home aged care service providers in Victoria; and
- asymptomatic freight workers who are required to travel interstate as a driver of a heavy vehicle or crew.

This item is not to be claimed with other pathology items. A patient episode initiation (PEI) rebate or bulk incentive (BBI) will not be applicable with MBS item 69501. However, an MBS fee has been applied to the item 69501 so that it is equivalent to the total MBS rebate paid for MBS item 69480 when claimed with the PEI and BBI for a private sector collection centre sample (MBS item 73928 and MBS item 74995). A PEI not been applied to MBS item 69501 as the Government may assist with collecting samples, which would PEI or BBI.

Testing services under the new item can only be provided by private sector pathology providers, must be and are not available to hospital in-patients.

The item requires reporting of test results to all appropriate authorities in accordance with the relevant state legislation or regulations and patients, within 24 hours of receipt of the specimen.

Testing for asymptomatic workers who are required to travel interstate as a driver of a heavy vehicle can nationally.

Testing for asymptomatic workers of residential and in-home aged care service providers is only available who are employed, hired, retained or contracted by an aged care service provider in Victoria.

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Hot Issues Brief

COVID-19 Testing Clinics 27 December 2021

Issue:

- As at Monday 27 December 2021 (public holiday), Queensland has 123 of its 130 testing locations operating, noting that a number of these are by appointment only.
- There are over 230 private pathology testing locations in Queensland, however, most of these sites have been closed from 25 to 27 December 2021.
- Queensland Health staff are continuing to work over the Christmas and New Year period to ensure that
 testing sites are up and running, with minimal disruptions to locations and hours of service. The total
 number of staff working across these sites is not available.
- Between public and private laboratories, Queensland can process around 60,000 COVID-19 PCR tests per day.

Background:

- Media agencies are reporting that there are delays for the public to receive a COVID-19 PCR test and the
 associated results over the holiday period.
- On 27 December 2021, the Courier-Mail published the article 'COVID Qld: Families in limbo as test result
 waiting times blow out'.
- In response to increases in cases since the opening of the border on the 13 December, the requirement for a GP referral to private pathology was waived on 17 December 2021.
- . The following factors increases demand for PCR testing in Queensland:
 - Increasing cases in the community and subsequent increase in close contacts.
 - Increasing public exposure sites, including high-traffic locations such as shopping centres and restaurants, pubs and clubs in the lead up to Christmas.
 - Day 5 testing requirements for arrivals from interstate hotspots.
 - Pre-departure testing requirements for Queenslanders travelling to other jurisdictions that consider Queensland a hotspot.
- The following factors decreases demand for PCR testing in Queensland:
 - The shorter 7-day quarantine period for vaccinated close contacts. People need 2 tests when in 7-day guarantine compared to 3 tests for 14 days guarantine.
 - Removal of pre and post arrival testing requirements for interstate travel.
- A table showing the current status of PCR testing across all Queensland Hospital and Health Service catchments for 27 December 2021 is at appendix 1.

Actions to date:

- A number of Hospital and Health Services have identified an ability to increase their number of testing
 locations as surge capacity over the Christmas period, ability to extend hours and through put, and ability
 to mobilise 24 hours capacity. This was in addition to the number of routine clinics already established.
- The most recent status of these measures as of 27 December 2021 are:
 - Cairns HHS Concierge triage in place outside clinics to help prioritise testing for vulnerable cohorts. Additional staff added and working on increasing opening hours into the evening
 - Gold Coast HHS Looking to increase staff today to meet demand
 - Metro South HHS:
 - have opened up a drive through at Logan West, for at least a few days to mitigate the reduced hours of private pathology
 - not extending formal opening hours but have extended staffing for several hours after formal closing time to meet the existing line (at closing time)
 - Metro North HHS while opening hours remain the same (cannot extended beyond 0800-2100), have prioritised additional staffing to be put on the RBWH
 - Sunshine Coast HHS main concern is Noosa currently. Further update pending.

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

Please attribute to a spokesperson for Queensland Health / HHS:

We thank Queenslanders for their patience and continuing willingness to come out and get tested.

PCR testing demand escalated quickly in Queensland in December 2021, and continues to place pressure on hospital and health services and private pathology providers, particularly over the Christmas/New Year period, where many private testing clinics have

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been closed and pressure on the remaining public and private providers has been greater.

Removing the day 5 PCR testing requirement for those entering Queensland, changes to the definitions of close and casual contacts, and expanded use of Rapid Antigen Testing (RAT) will all assist to ease the testing burden over coming days and weeks. *Most* private pathology providers will return to normal operating hours on Tuesday 4 January 2022, following the Christmas/New Year period.

People with symptoms of COVID -19

Only those with symptoms of COVID-19 need to get a PCR test.

If you've taken a RAT and receive a positive result, you should assume you have COVID-19 and should immediately isolate at home with all household members. You may have reduced waiting time for a confirmatory PCR test if you delay this until the 4th January.

Contacts of known cases who do not have confirmed COVID -19 and who are in quarantine awaiting day 6 testing to be released.

If you have access to a RAT test at home and it is negative on day 6, you do not need to get a PCR test and can leave quarantine after 7 days since your contact, assuming you are symptom free.

If you do not have access to RAT test, we recommend you defer your day 6 PCR test until the 4th January when greater testing clinics will mean wait times are much less.

Starting from 5th January, RAT tests will be increasingly available to be handed out to eligible close contacts attending state health clinics requiring day 6 testing prior to release from quarantine. These test kits will be provided free to eligible close contacts.

Background - not for attribution:

Recent decisions of National Cabinet included the strong advice that PCR testing should be reserved for people with symptoms of COVID-19, and that a RAT is acceptable for quarantine exit for asymptomatic people.

Wait times for many testing clinics across Queensland tend to be shorter in the afternoon.

We thank Queenslanders for their patience and continuing willingness to come out and get tested.

PCR testing demand escalated quickly in Queensland in December 2021, and continues to place pressure on hospital and health services and private pathology providers, particularly over the Christmas/New Year period, where many private testing clinics have been closed and pressure on the remaining public and private providers has been greater.

Removing the day 5 PCR testing requirement for those entering Queensland, changes to the definitions of close and casual contacts, and expanded use of Rapid Antigen Testing (RAT) will all assist to ease the testing burden over coming days and weeks. *Most* private pathology providers will return to normal operating hours on Tuesday 4 January 2022, following the Christmas/New Year period.

People with symptoms of COVID -19

Only those with symptoms of COVID-19 need to get a PCR test.

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If you've taken a RAT and receive a positive result, you should assume you have COVID-19 and should immediately isolate at home with all household members. You may have reduced waiting time for a confirmatory PCR test if you delay this until the 4th January.

Contacts of known cases who do not have confirmed COVID -19 and who are in quarantine awaiting day 6 testing to be released.

If you have access to a RAT test at home and it is negative on day 6, you do not need to get a PCR test and can leave quarantine after 7 days since your contact, assuming you are symptom free.

If you do not have access to RAT test, we recommend you defer your day 6 PCR test until the 4th January when greater testing clinics will mean wait times are much less.

Starting from 5th January, RAT tests will be increasingly available to be handed out to eligible close contacts attending state health clinics requiring day 6 testing prior to release from quarantine. These test kits will be provided free to eligible close contacts.

Background - not for attribution:

Recent decisions of National Cabinet included the strong advice that PCR testing should be reserved for people with symptoms of COVID-19, and that a RAT is acceptable for quarantine exit for asymptomatic people.

Wait times for many testing clinics across Queensland tend to be shorter in the afternoon.

The meeting with the privates was useful.

On the call were QML, 4Cyte, ACL, Clinical Labs, SNP, Mater, and Genomics4Life.

The key issues impacting them are:

- 1. Shift from batch testing (10 samples at once) to single testing, reduces their throughput capacity by around 50% we are collating their new max capacity
- 2. Reagents some of the providers indicated that they had supply chain issues with reagents which is compounded by the move to single tests.
- 3. Staffing the impact of the holidays, plus the impact of staff who are positive or a close contact for COVID has had and continues to have a significant impact on their capacity
- 4. Specific policy issues impacting demand
- -SNP indicated significant resources (almost all their capacity of 8-9k per day) going to the Cwth resi aged care, with PCR testing of mostly staff including follow up surveillance of contacts.
- All indicated significant demand due to pre-admission screening in private sector with private specialists and hospitals requiring PCR test within 72 hours of elective admission.
- Confirmatory tests from positive RAT tests. All indicated that there are significant demand for this, and it is a TGA requirement in the instructions that tells people to present for PCR to confirm positive test.
- 5. Things that may assist them to expand capacity
- changes to furloughing rules to reduce impact of quarantine for contacts
- better support for drive in clinics. They are facing significant local resident complaints about these clinics, and the
 queues create some civil disturbance at times. QPS can sometimes be helpful and sometimes closes them
 down. Perhaps some support for queue management they fund themselves.
- change to the requirements for pre-hospital screening and also for the surveillance and contact follow up in resi care sector
- 6. Have they been approached by Cwth to hand out free RAT in their queues?

They have not been approached. They would consider if we provided to them but would need details and would not want the queue management and handout to take their technical experts away from testing. Note there is no Cwth payment for people who they turn away from PCR line.

As discussed with Matt, please can you kindly seek urgent advice from QLD Health - COVID Incident Management Team about what funding arrangements will be in place when MBS item 69501 ceases on 1 January 2022.

Cwlth release

To assist states and territories with interstate rail crew and transport worker border crossings, the Australian Government created a unique Medicare item (69501), available to rail crew workers or heavy vehicle drivers who are required to travel interstate for work. MBS item 69501 is available for COVID-19 tests performed by private sector pathology providers who are approached directly by an interstate transport worker for a test. MBS item 69501 will cease on 1 January 2022.

As you are aware TMR has established <u>4x freight dedicated testing facilities</u>, operated by 4Cyte and QML. This Medicare cessation will call into question the viability of these facilities to continue if there is no funding in place.

For greater context whilst the <u>QLD Freight Protocol</u> is being amended next week to align with acceptable risk levels associated easing of border restrictions, the 7 day rolling surveillance testing will remain for freight. To date, no discussions have been held regarding the CHO's posturing for QLD asymptomatic testing of freight and logistics operators post 1 January 2022.

Also, 5x NSW freight-friendly testing sites are also closing on the 15th Dec. and the remaining will close for a Christmas period, increasing pressure on the QLD system.

I will need to convene a meeting to discuss as soon as feasible.

Please can you kindly keep us advised of your discussions with QLD Health and A/ CHO Dr Peter Aitken (I believe Dr Aitken is resuming DDG duties) as this is an issue that is escalated to Minister Bailey and TMR DG-Scales.

Please see attached advice from Cwlth as regards the following:

To assist states and territories with interstate rail crew and transport worker border crossings, the Australian Government created a unique Medicare item (69501), available to rail crew workers or heavy vehicle drivers who are required to travel interstate for work. MBS item 69501 is available for COVID-19 tests performed by private sector pathology providers who are approached directly by an interstate transport worker for a test. MBS item 69501 will cease on 1 January 2022.

The cost associated with interstate transport worker COVID-19 testing provided by state and territory governments continues to be covered under the National Partnership on COVID-19 Response (Partnership). The Australian Government provides financial support to all state and territory governments for COVID-19 testing through the Partnership, funding 50 per cent of the costs of public health testing facilities. Under the Partnership, all governments have committed to providing COVID-19 pathology testing to people in Australia free of-charge, including freight and transport workers.

Through the Partnership, the Australian Government has provided over \$7.0 billion in funding to support state and territory health systems respond to COVID-19 outbreaks as of 7 November 2021. In particular, the Partnership has provided \$270.0 million in the 2020-21 and 2021-22 financial years in direct funding to COVID-19 PCR testing delivered in state and territory clinics. Partnership funding is demand driven with no cap on funding.

This mechanism for the Australian Government to support ready access to testing for COVID-19 has been in place since the start of the pandemic and has worked well to support testing as a critical component of our successful response. A fundamental principle remains, and should continue, no costs should be imposed on those requiring a test, including necessary testing associated with border crossings.

Where COVID-19 testing is medically necessary and has been requested by a doctor, it is appropriately funded by the Australian Government through the MBS.

Where COVID-19 testing is undertaken for public health purposes, for example asymptomatic testing for travel, workplace testing, or testing of casual or close contacts, it is appropriately funded through the Partnership.

What does this mean for providers?

The introduction of this new item affords private sector pathology providers the ability to provide microbio for SARS-CoV-2 to:

- asymptomatic workers of residential and in-home aged care service providers in Victoria; and
- asymptomatic freight workers who are required to travel interstate as a driver of a heavy vehicle increw.

This item is not to be claimed with other pathology items. A patient episode initiation (PEI) rebate or bulk incentive (BBI) will not be applicable with MBS Item 69501. However, an MBS fee has been applied to the item 69501 so that it is equivalent to the total MBS rebate paid for MBS item 69480 when claimed with the PEI and BBI for a private sector collection centre sample (MBS item 73928 and MBS item 74995). A PEI not been applied to MBS item 69501 as the Government may assist with collecting samples, which would PEI or BBI.

Testing services under the new item can only be provided by private sector pathology providers, must be and are not available to hospital in-patients.

The item requires reporting of test results to all appropriate authorities in accordance with the relevant stategislation or regulations and patients, within 24 hours of receipt of the specimen.

Testing for asymptomatic workers who are required to travel interstate as a driver of a heavy vehicle can nationally.

Testing for asymptomatic workers of residential and in-home aged care service providers is only available who are employed, hired, retained or contracted by an aged care service provider in Victoria.

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Hot Issues Brief

COVID-19 Testing Clinics 27 December 2021

ssue:

- As at Monday 27 December 2021 (public holiday), Queensland has 123 of its 130 testing locations operating, noting that a number of these are by appointment only.
- There are over 230 private pathology testing locations in Queensland, however, most of these sites have been closed from 25 to 27 December 2021.
- Queensland Health staff are continuing to work over the Christmas and New Year period to ensure that
 testing sites are up and running, with minimal disruptions to locations and hours of service. The total
 number of staff working across these sites is not available.
- Between public and private laboratories, Queensland can process around 60,000 COVID-19 PCR tests per day.

Background:

- Media agencies are reporting that there are delays for the public to receive a COVID-19 PCR test and the
 associated results over the holiday period.
- On 27 December 2021, the Courier-Mail published the article 'COVID Qld: Families in limbo as test result
 waiting times blow out'.
- In response to increases in cases since the opening of the border on the 13 December, the requirement for a GP referral to private pathology was waived on 17 December 2021.
- . The following factors increases demand for PCR testing in Queensland:
 - Increasing cases in the community and subsequent increase in close contacts.
 - Increasing public exposure sites, including high-traffic locations such as shopping centres and restaurants, pubs and clubs in the lead up to Christmas.
 - Day 5 testing requirements for arrivals from interstate hotspots.
 - Pre-departure testing requirements for Queenslanders travelling to other jurisdictions that consider Queensland a hotspot.
- The following factors decreases demand for PCR testing in Queensland:
 - The shorter 7-day quarantine period for vaccinated close contacts. People need 2 tests when in 7-day quarantine compared to 3 tests for 14 days quarantine.
 - Removal of pre and post arrival testing requirements for interstate travel.
- A table showing the current status of PCR testing across all Queensland Hospital and Health Service catchments for 27 December 2021 is at appendix 1.

Actions to date:

- A number of Hospital and Health Services have identified an ability to increase their number of testing
 locations as surge capacity over the Christmas period, ability to extend hours and through put, and ability
 to mobilise 24 hours capacity. This was in addition to the number of routine clinics already established.
- The most recent status of these measures as of 27 December 2021 are:
 - Cairns HHS Concierge triage in place outside clinics to help prioritise testing for vulnerable cohorts. Additional staff added and working on increasing opening hours into the evening
 - Gold Coast HHS Looking to increase staff today to meet demand
 - o Metro South HHS:
 - have opened up a drive through at Logan West, for at least a few days to mitigate the reduced hours of private pathology
 - not extending formal opening hours but have extended staffing for several hours after formal closing time to meet the existing line (at closing time)
 - Metro North HHS while opening hours remain the same (cannot extended beyond 0800-2100), have prioritised additional staffing to be put on the RBWH
 - Sunshine Coast HHS main concern is Noosa currently. Further update pending.
 - o COVAX
